We hope you find this booklet useful.


Attendance and The Law

As a parent, you are responsible for ensuring your child attends school regularly.

Parents are committing an offence if they fail to ensure their child's regular attendance at school. This may lead to a penalty notice or prosecution.

WHY IS ATTENDANCE IMPORTANT?

ATTENDANCE NUMBER OF DAYS ABSENT FROM SCHOOL

100% = FULL ATTENDANCE

93% = 13 DAYS 90% = 19 DAYS 85% = 38 DAYS 75% = 47 DAYS

1 DAY ABSENT = 5 HOURS OF LEARNING MISSED 3 DAYS

ABSENT = 15 HOURS OF LEARNING MISSED 1 WEEK ABSENT = 25 HOURS OF LEARNING MISSED 2 WEEKS ABSENT = 50

HOURS OF LEARNING MISSED 3 WEEKS ABSENT = 75

An exam result of 90% would be a good achievement, however, in relation to school attendance, it means you have missed 95 hours of learning during one academic year!

IF A PUPIL HAD 80% ATTENDANCE THROUGHOUT YEARS 1-6, IT WOULD EQUAL MISSING A FULL YEAR OF SCHOOL!


LATENESS

Being late adds up to a loss of learning.

If you are late every day, that adds up to over three days lost each year.

Fifteen minutes late is the same as being absent for two weeks a year.

Being late every day can add up to a lot of lost learning time.

Please help your child to be punctual.

If you are worried about your child's attendance, please talk to us at school about it.

If Your Child is Absent from School:

The procedure for reporting absence is:

- On the first day of absence, parents contact the school office to inform school of the reason for the absence and to advise of a date for their return.
- The School operates a system of First Day Contact, which means if you fail to contact school and your child is absent, you will be contacted by the school.
- Pupils need to be in their classroom at 8:55am and anybody arriving after this time will be registered as late. Arriving late can have a detrimental effect on your child's learning, as they miss the beginning of lessons.
- If you are worried about your child's attendance or punctuality please talk to school about it.



Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Why is attendance so important?

Evidence shows that if a child does not attend regularly:

- They cannot keep up with their class work.
- They do not achieve the results they deserve
- They miss out on the social side of school and can have problems maintaining friendships.

Q. My child has 90% attendance, that is good isn't it?

No, in relation to the amount of days absent over a year this would equal 19 days absence, nearly four weeks off school.

Q. My child has odd days off now and again, surely they are not going to miss too much?

These odd days can surprisingly add up and during this time they could be missing out on crucial learning.

Q. My child is only absent when she is ill.

- If your child is ill you need to contact school to let them know.
- If your child is persistently absent due to illness, we may request medical confirmation e.g. Doctors certificate.

Q. What difference does it make if my child is a few minutes late?

- Arriving late causes disruption and can be embarrassing for the child.
 E.g. Walking into class when everyone is working.
- By arriving late, they can miss the initial teacher input which would make it difficult for them to understand the lesson.

Q. I would like to book a holiday in term time, how many days am I entitled to?

No holidays will be authorised during term time.
